




Number of Fatal Work Injuries

Number And Rate of Fatal Work Injuries, by Industry Sector, 2018



Site-Specific Targeting 2016 (SST-16)

- Effective Oct. 16, 2018.
- Programmed inspection list that utilizes the 2016 300A data that was electronically submitted in December 2017.
- Select and schedule programmed inspections for non-construction employers with 20 or more employees.



Site-Specific Targeting 2016 (SST-16)

- Sampling of "high rate" establishments, divided 50/50 between manufacturing and nonmanufacturing.
- A random sample of "non-responders" or establishments that did not electronically submit their 300A.
- The list will also include a random sample of "low-rate" establishments for QA purposes.
